研究成果の概要(和文):この研究は、日本における認知症ケアにおけるアートの役割に焦点を当て、その利点、実施戦略、現在の取り組みについて検討したものです。認知症患者とその介護者の利益、アートコーディネーターとアーティストへのトレーニングとサポート、地域組織とのコラボレーション、国際的な研究者からのベストプラクティスを学ぶことを目指した。国際的なコラボレーションとして、英国や米国を拠点とする団体や施設と連携して、認知症トレーニングやワークショップが行われました。また、芸術介入の効果をさらに評価し、最適な実施戦略を探り、成果を測定するためにデータを収集した。

## 研究成果の学術的意義や社会的意義

International collaborations were created and the importance of evaluation, co-production/co-creativity and machizukuri practices between researchers and stakeholders were proven necessary to establish the growth and development of using the arts as a component of dementia care.

研究成果の概要(英文): This research focused on the role of arts in dementia care in Japan, examining its benefits, implementation strategies, and current initiatives. It sought to benefit persons living with dementia and their carers, provide training and support to art coordinators and artists, collaborate with community organizations, and learn best practices from international researchers. International collaborations were created with dementia training and workshops were provided in collaboration with UK and US-based organizations and facilities. From these collaborations, symposia and training sessions were organized in Japan that targeted carers, artists, and art coordinators (2018, 2019, 2022). The project culminated with arts-based workshops that directly benefited the community in Toride, Ibaraki in coordination with community organizations (2022). Data was also gathered to further assess the effectiveness of arts interventions, explore optimal implementation strategies, and measure outcomes.

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## 1.研究開始当初の背景

## **DESIGNING FOR DEMENTIA:**

## **Integrating Standards of Art and Design into Healthcare Facilities**

Dementia is a growing public health concern globally, with Japan being one of the countries heavily affected by this condition. The primacy of dementia in Japan is expected to increase significantly due to an aging population, with all prefectures excluding Tokyo projected to have a dementia prevalence rate exceeding 25 to 30 percent in 2045 (Nakahori, et al., 2021). Because of this, interest in exploring non-pharmacological interventions to enhance the well-being and quality of life for individuals living with dementia is gaining attention among researchers in Japan and overseas. One such intervention that has gained attention is the use of arts in dementia care. The value of including arts programs into healthcare facilities to well-being has been widely documented and used by hospitals in Europe, the USA, Canada and Australia, and is backed by worldwide research (Camic, 2018, and Wikoff, 2004). Integrating an arts program into healthcare facilities can reduce the anxiety and stress of patients and positively affect their clinical outcomes, support the morale of their families and caregivers, alleviate tension among the hospital staff and enhance the quality of their service. In Japan, Orange Cafes and organizations such as Dementia Friendship Club utilizes the outpour of local energy and resources to achieve a bottom-up approach to dementia care. Known as machizukuri, local citizens take on the reins of local management and governance, a concept that widely spread during the 1990s that and emphasizes the role of civil society (Sorensen & Funck, 2007). By combining the knowledge and expertise of researchers and organizations overseas with machizukuri, this research aims to find solutions that are not only cost-effective and sustainable, but also innovative and will contribute to worldwide research on dementia.

The challenge in performing this research lies in careful planning and coordination, collating knowledge and translating data. However, the benefits lie in bringing a new dimension into the care for dementia patients and their caregivers, with results that are aimed to be easily replicated and used in other facilities and communities, especially those that have a high incidence of persons living with dementia. In addition, this research impacts a wide range of the population, which does not only include persons living with dementia and their caregivers, but also academics, artists, students, and members of the community as well.

The impact of the study also includes the following:

- Raise awareness concerning the needs of patients and their caregivers.
- Integrate evaluation to measure the quality of care at healthcare facilities and community-based art projects for patients with dementia.
- Fill in gaps and contribute to the worldwide research on dementia.
- Contribute to the field of art and design and its impact on society.

- Develop a clear rationale and curriculum for education in creativity, wellness, and the
  arts.
- Increase international visibility of Japan-led arts in hospital research through international collaborations.

This study explores the role of arts in dementia care in Japan, the UK, and the USA through their implementation strategies by highlighting the importance of culturally specific, community-based projects in creating evidence-based knowledge on the benefits of the arts on persons living with dementia. By using and integrating best practices, it seeks to integrate evaluation practices and establish the growth and development of using the arts as a component of dementia care in healthcare and community-based art projects in Japan.

### 2. 研究の目的

Despite Japan's robust volunteering program that tackles the problem of supporting the elderly with dementia, it does not have a reliable system of evaluating the quality of care. In addition, there has been no government-led directive that advocates for the care of dementia sufferers and their caregivers. Therefore, it is crucial to conduct thorough background research on dementia, not only through second-hand sources but also through participant observation, discussion, consultation with experts, as well as international collaborators. In addition to advocating for person-centered care and spreading awareness of the advantages of the arts and arts-based activities for people living with dementia, the main goals of this research are to add a new dimension to the care for dementia patients and their caregivers, with findings that may be easily replicated and applied in other facilities and communities, particularly those with a high prevalence of people living with dementia.

While American organizations like the Alzheimer's Association focus on raising awareness and educating the public, the UK government has already established standards for caring for dementia patients and multiple UK DRIs (UK Dementia Research Institutes). However, due to linguistic and cultural difficulties, not all of their approaches are applicable in Japan. International cooperation, however, meant that they could also learn from Japan's experience with dementia in addition to what the UK and the USA can teach Japan about dementia. Taking into consideration Japan's social and cultural background, as well as the limitations of the research design, the aims of the study focused on community-based art activities that will create an evidence-based methods of evaluation to measure the quality of care at community-based art projects for patients with dementia and create culturally specific arts-based activities on that can serve as a guideline and inspiration for community-based organizations and educational institutions.

### 3.研究の方法

In this research, I collaborated with researchers, artists, and art coordinators in Japan and overseas to explore the nature of dementia, and tackle challenges that focus on how arts-based activities

can help persons living with dementia have a better quality of life. I combined field work, seminars, training sessions, and workshops to identify and solve social problems and engage in activities with real world impact. Drawing upon the multiple ways of design research and implementation by organizations particularly in the United Kingdom and the United States, I decided to combine the elements of co-creative processes (Zeilig et. Al, 2018), evaluation (Daykin, et. al 2016, 2017 and Gray, 2020) and creative art expression based on Memories in the Making art program, culminating into a series of arts-based workshops in coordination with Toride Art Project, a community-based organization in Toride, Ibaraki.

#### 4.研究成果

To improve evaluation practices and establish the growth and development of using the arts as a component of dementia care, co-production between researchers and stakeholders is required. Barriers that are structural, cultural, and characterized by unequal stakeholder relationships can hamper effective co-production despite best efforts.

While the arts are frequently embraced by community arts organizers where they can improve the day-to-day experiences of persons living with dementia and caregivers, evaluation systems and procedures are still perceived as adding extra stress and occasionally gets in the way of practice. Co-production and co-creative processes, which typically refers to consultation, collaboration, and the creation of a common vision between researchers, organizations, and participants is a crucial element in research. One recommended tactic for resolving some of the evaluation issues that this research ran into was co-production, especially with artists, art coordinators, and community-based organizations, in which *machizukuri* practices are well-suited. To effectively integrate evaluation into service delivery, co-production or *machizukuri* practices appears to be especially crucial during the evaluation planning phase. However, this also implies that lengthier lead periods, including training and education as well as more thorough method consulting than is typically required are needed.

It is imperative to note that it can be difficult for organizations and institutions to maintain arts programs in dementia care since they need sufficient financial resources. Raising public awareness of the advantages of the arts in dementia care and fighting for policy support can help to integrate arts-based interventions into common dementia care practices. Ensuring that arts programs are accessible to people with different levels of dementia and physical abilities is essential for promoting inclusivity and equal opportunities for engagement. Lastly, it is necessary to conduct more study to evaluate the efficacy of artistic interventions in dementia care, look into the best methods of implementation, and track long-term results.
